## Photography Day

## Pebbles

Pebbles had a fantastic visit to the farm. The sun was shining on us as Jackie from Treleague dairy farm gave us an incredible tour. We saw at first hand the cows being milked and learnt that the cows are milked twice a day. We watched their udders being cleaned and the machine extracting the milk. We were able to read the monitors to see how much milk each cow produced and how long it took. It was great to see the cows resting on their sandy beds and eating silage. We smelt and touched it and learned that barley, grass and vitamins make silage. We watched lots of different tractors at work doing different jobs from cutting the silage to scooping out the slurry. In the processing room we learnt about heating the milk and pasterising it, separating the cream to make different types of milk and other products such as clotted cream and butter. We saw the calves and watched them being fed with a sweet milk substitute. Finally we had a lovely milkshake and biscuits outside on the benches, We all agreed that we were very lucky to see how dairy farming works at first hand.

Pebbles are excited that they will be visiting Tregullas farm next week.

The hard work continues in Starfish as we approach the end of a busy and productive term. In English, we are completing our instructions unit with the children writing instructions on how to make a pneumatic monster.



In Maths, our work on fractions continues and we are pleased with the way the children are beginning to grasp what is often a tricky topic. Please would you encourage your child to practice their KIRFs (Key Instant Recall Facts) for their end of term test next Wednesday. Information and practise quiz sheets are on our class page of Google Classroom. It is important that the children become secure with these basic number skills as they need to apply them in many aspects of maths.

Many thanks to Mr Studd, the PE coordinator for the Trust, for coming in and teaching Orienteering to the children. They really enjoyed the session, hopefully they have told you about it.

As you can see from the photographs, we have been studying Forces and Magnets in Science. This week, Starfish had fun investigating magnetic and non-magnetic materials and recorded their findings.

#### Footprints

Well, what a few weeks it has been! We are finally all back together and the children have shown such patience and adaptability as we have revisited learning for those who missed out. We have been exploring instructions for how to build a healthy mind and used these skills in science to follow and write instructions for how to build a simple circuit. The children have also written their own stories, developed ideas and chosen success criteria for writing. In maths, we have learnt all about fractions: from recapping the basics of what a fraction is, to equivalent fractions and calculating with fractions. It has been quite a journey! They have also begun to secure their understanding of decimal equivalents of fractions in this half terms' KIRF.

On Tuesday, Miss Johns took the class to the rescheduled rugby tournament. We have two teams who played a number of games against local schools. The class debriefed me on Wednesday and I think it's fair to say that the event didn't go as well as they would have liked! In the words of the children, "The only reason Team A won 4<sup>th</sup> place was because they played our Team B". However, Mrs Reid (who also joined them) said that she was incredibly impressed with their determination and team spirit. They didn't give up, even when things were tough, and even went back in for more so they didn't let their team down.

As we approach the summer term, our new topic web will appear on Google Classroom. You will also see knowledge organisers and learning journeys for each subject. Please make sure you look as it's a great way to talk with the children about their learning and for families to see what they will be learning about in school!

We investigated how to reduce food miles and help prevent climate change by growing plants in Cornwall that normally prefer warmer climates. Like real scientists, we discovered the importance of repeating experiments to ensure the results are reliable, and that sometimes our
